New Café Opens at the Cynwyd Station



The Trail's End Café at Cynwyd Station opened Sunday, June 5th with live music, cake and ice cream, and an official ribbon cutting.



The Café occupies the historic Cynwyd Train Station, along the rail line that connects Lower Merion with Center City Philadelphia and at the start of the Cynwyd Heritage Trail that ties into the region's network of cycling paths and walking trails. *Trail's End Café* serves coffee and espresso drinks, tea, and sparkling water. It operates from 7 AM weekdays and from 9 AM weekends to nine at night.
