The proceedings included a presentation by our intern, lifelong Lower Merion resident Xandra O'Neill, who spent last summer inventorying and rehousing our flat file collection, researching the Jewish community in Lower Merion, and developing a guide to using our collections to aid in genealogical research. We look forward to publishing her work on our website soon!



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In May, Board member Jim Bevlock gave a historical presentation to the sisters of Merion Mercy Convent. He shared images and information about the history of the convent grounds and surrounding neighborhood, including the General Wayne Inn, Belmont Driving Park, Washington's encampment in 1777, and Merion Friends Meetinghouse.

To round out our recent public programs, Treasurer Craig Whitney and Board member Brad Upp hosted an informational table at the Juneteenth Block Party Celebration organized by PALM: Center for Positive Aging of Lower Merion. It was a lively community event anchored in themes of freedom and culture, along with some excellent Civil War-era fashions!





Historical Society Rewind

Philadelphia is a city steeped in history, and in celebrations of history. In 1876, Philadelphia hosted 10 million visitors at the Centennial International Exposition/World's Fair at Fairmount Park, showcasing American industrial and cultural achievements to a global audience. Anyone who visited the Please Touch Museum in recent decades will remember its scale model of the fairgrounds and its 200 structures, a testament to the massive scope of

this event.

How did the Centennial influence Lower Merion and Narberth? One interesting connection has to do with the origins of Kindergarten in the United States.

One of the many Kindergarten exhibits at the Centennial was "The American Kindergarten", where Miss Emily Maria Coe of New York City taught her adaptation of the Froebel educational system and also trained teachers in her methods (Friedrich Froebel's system of Kindergarten or "Children's Garden" was developed in Germany in the first half of the 19th century, using "Froebel's gifts," tools he designed for creative play after decades of educating young children).

You may ask what became of the American Kindergarten exhibit that Miss Coe designed and paid for?

Here is the almost unbelievable answer: the small frame building (below, left) was purchased, dismantled, and reassembled elsewhere, as many Centennial buildings were. "The American Kindergarten" was reassembled right here in Lower Merion, adjacent to the Lower Merion Academy where it served as the Union Sunday School for almost 50 years (below, right, peeking out behind the Academy). The building was demolished almost exactly a century ago, making way for what later became the bus circle outside Bala Cynwyd Middle School.
