At this time the deed of the Memorial Library was presented by our President to the President of the Library Ass. Mrs. Trumper & both buildings were open for inspection.
In presenting this her final report, the chairman of the Building Committee wishes to express her appreciation of the loyalty of all the members of the committee & especially of the constant devotion of our President to every detail of the work. November 17 1926

On Nov. 17th a regular meeting of the Women's Club of Bala-Cynwyd was held in the lecture room of the Pres. Church with 71 members and 3 guests present.
Mrs. Supplee read an original poem by Mrs. John Phillips, State Chairman of American Home, as an invocation.
This was followed by the minutes of the previous meeting and the Treas.' report, after which the Corresponding Sec'y read the list of people to whom invitations to the Cornerstone Laying had been sent, and also persons to whom letters of thanks had been written, etc. Mrs. Supplee announced with deep regret the death of Mrs. Van Horn.
The Southeastern District want to plant a tree in memory of Mrs. Stephenson, on our lot, and will do so as soon as the ground is in the proper condition.
Mrs. Gibbons then read the list of books recommended for this month and gave a short account of each.
Mrs. Kinder said a few words about the Cornerstone Laying. There were two impressions created that day which were not correct:- Our club house is not a memorial and it has always been the intention of the club that the Library should be a tribute to all who served in the war as well as a memorial to those who died. In order to make this more clearer it was moved by Mrs. Kinder that the Library be given by the Woman's Club as a memorial to those who died and a tribute to those who served. There was some discussion and the motion was then carried.
Mrs. Gregory gave the report for the Library, announcing the books which have been added recently, etc. and also announcing a Library Benefit at the Bala-Cynwyd movies Nov. 24th.

Miss Alice Wightman then entertained us with some delightful Pianologues, and she was followed by Mrs. John D. Brooks, Montg. Co. Chairman of Publicity who was our speaker of the afternoon. Her subject was Club Women as Advertisements. Miss Wightman gave us more Pianologues, after which Mrs. Supplee announced a letter from Mrs. Frick, stating that the Southeastern District is starting an entertainment bureau and asking if anyone from our club would be willing to give programs to other clubs.

A discussion of the contents of the box to be put in the Cornerstone was in order and it was decided to put in a Bible, coins of the denominations from \$.01 to \$1.00, stamps of the Sesqui year from \$.01 to \$.25, a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws, the last issue of the Bala-Cynwyd News, literature of the Building Fund Campaign, the Nov. club calendar, the minutes of the meeting in which it was decided to buy the lot and the minutes of the special meeting at which the plans for the two buildings were accepted, the program of the cornerstone laying, and a copy of the invitations sent out for it, the radio program of Nov. 4th, a short history of the club, an appreciation of Mrs. Beck and Mrs. Stephenson written after their deaths, the morning Ledger, and the visiting cards of the members of the Board.
The question has been brought up as to whether the Library is to be a memorial to those who died or to those who served in the war. On Mrs. Kershaw's suggestion it was decided that it would be "In Memory of Those Who Died, and a Tribute to Those Who Served in the World War."
